## Page 79, insert at beginning of paragraph:

9th .- Arose before daylight in order to make an early start, as we had a long ride to make Caldwell before night, on going to the pump, a man was lying upon the platform over the well apparently lifeless, on mentioning the circumstance to the cow-boys in the house - who were still carousing over their cards and whisky, they let us understand that it need not concern us how he came to be lying there, but one of them, after a short time volunteered an explanation to the effect that he had gone to the pump to get a drink, and the pump-handle flew up and struck the side of his head, knocking his down, and as nothing could be done for him they let him lie. We thought best, to make no farther remarks about the remarkable behavior of the pump-handle, especially as it was civil enough when we approached it. The man was lying there when we left - whether dead or drunk we did not find out, as it might not have been entirely a safe experiment to have investigated more closely. It was not however unlikely that he might have been the victim of some drunken quarrel, arising from their gambling, as angry words and desperate threats frequently broke in upon our slumbers during the night.

## Page 92, after last paragraph:

As a pertinent illustration of this practice, the case of Tosh-e-quah - a former chief among the Wichitas might be mentioned. Having become much weakened through the infirmities of age and neglect, he was left last siping by his people to struggle with weakness, disease and wolves as best he could. In this condition he was found, by one of the Agency hands, and promptly taken to the Agency. Here he was properly provided with food, clothing and medicine and he was soon able to walk
