to a point designated, which enabled us to reach our forage the day after overtaking the Indians.

Dr. O'3rien rendered great and willing assistance in trailing. I was glad to have him along the ditizens did well and were gratefull enough, to acknowledge that they could have done nothing without the aid of troops, as usual they were profuse in nersonal acknowledgments.

My men behaved well during the entire scout although I thought at times that they had it pretty rough and were marched pretty hard. I heard no complaints of any nature.

The animals returned in good condition I turned over the recovered stock to the owners after returning to our wagons. There were enough of them to get home safe, they remained with us over night and my men loaned them tents and I think shared their rations with them.

I marched from this Post to Mulberry Creek, thence to the head of Thompson Creek, thence to the Town of Smallwood on Mule Creek, thence to Sun City on Medicine Creek and back to Turkey Creek, thence to the Mouth of Clear Creek, (laid over one day) thence to Coles Ranch on Mule Creek, thence to Nixon's Ranche on Kiowa Creek, thence back to Mulberry Creek, pursuant to Order I made inquiries from
