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The country through which we marched is mostly level the soil is principally sand, and at intervals interspersed with clay except on the borders of the streams it is suitable only for grazing purposes from Bear Creek to the Arkansas River we found no wood.

We saw no evidence or signs of Indians whatever but the tracks of hunters could be seen at all points. On the Cimarron large numbers of buffalo were seen.

The Guide Mr McGentry gave great satisfaction, did his duty willingly and seemed to know the country thoroughly. Please find herewith in closed a journal of the March
