

Mr. Spotted Horn Bull is mentioned in
McLaughlin's book "my friend the Indian".
This is the same woman. I think has very been
to call the Indian Policemen "jealous men; jealous
Horn". You will note that McLaughlin omitted in
his book of what this woman said the morning
of the killing (Dec. 15. 1890) Her words were too
damaging to the Policemen. McLaughlin only wrote
the one side of the S. B. fight.

Some one (a policeman) struck Sitting Bull with
a small ash post - in the face and about the
head. Sitting Bull was dead when this was
done. His face was terribly mutilated.

In one of my writings, I said "on the evening
of December 17, 1890 a squad of soldiers from
the garrison (Fort Yates) in charge of P. G. Woods,
Quartermaster, quietly escorted the mutilated
body of Sitting Bull to the north west corner
of the military cemetery and laid to rest all
that was mortal, that warrior for the ages -
that defender of the plains!"

Jealousy was the cause for S. B. death.
