Dear Prof. Campbell:

I greatly appreciate your prompt and full reply to the queries contained in my letter. I have found the references to Isaiah in the Crawford book and also the explanation of how "Black Whiteman" became a Cheyenne name, in the Grinnell article on Bent's Fort. Later I may apply to Mr. Zahn, and thank you for your permission to use your name.

When I return to Kansas this summer I must try to find out what tribes contributed the Indian blood which most of the Negroes there possess, though I doubt that many will have any very definite information on the subject. There is Kiowa and Kaw, I know, and probably some from the Civilized Tribes, not to mention what comes in by way of Mexico.

I think I have read something by Mr. Gatchell on Frank Grouard; at least the name is familiar.

I am pleased that you should wish a list of my historical production and am enclosing one, though I doubt that any of them will interest you; most, as you will observe, are by-products of my Astor biography, prepared at the request of harried editors of historical journals. I am sorry I have no off-prints of the Negro-Indian article; it is the prize essay of the Association for the Study of Negro Life and History, for 1932, and it was and perhaps still is supposed to be published in book-form at some time or other.

I don't suppose you have ever encountered any of my verse; I assume the "things" of mine you have seen were of an historical nature. I am therefore taking the liberty to send you under sep-
