four Americans well known by about all schoolboys were Washington, Lincoln Cooper and Sitting Bull. Franklin un well kum & schoolbys, els. Sitting Bull is the local hero of this place, and I think this is being more and more realized. We seldom see our own heroes at first glance. A campaign boosting Sittin Bull is now in order, as you say. And I believe

that I, for one, will be fully satisfied with the book.
