religious frenzy and suggested violence as a remedy for real or fancied wrongs.

2d. Hunger and disease—the grippe among the adults and measles among the children.

3d. Distrust of the good faity of the Government, based on imperfect fulfillment of former promises and delay in carrying out the terms of recent agreement.

4th. The spoils system, as applied to the management of the Indian affairs, which has supplied feeble or unwise management at some of the agencies, has prevented continuity and harmony in the Government's work for the civilization of the Indians.

The remedy is simple in theory, but difficult, for manifest reasons, of execution.

The first and most important requisite is a single, responsible, competent head for the management of Indian affairs, and charged with that duty only, who shall report directly to the President, and who shall be looked to by the country at large for a successful Indian management. / to place marked on page 6.
