Mrs. Annie Brown:

I have your letter of November 16. I have been sick, or I would have answered sooner.

The man who buys and sells Indian goods is Mr. Reese Kincaide, The Mohonk Lodge, Clinton, Oklahoma. The Mohonk Lodge is a Mission business, or was when it was started. Mr. Kincaide gives the Indian women he knows down there the leather and beads and tells them what patterns he wants. Then they do the work, and he pays them for it. Then he sells what they make himself. I don't know whether he would like to buy things from Indians so far away, but I will write to him and tell him about you. I imagine that, if you can do good porcupine quill work, he would like to handle your work. Not many Indians do that now. Maybe you could get more money for that than for beads, because it is not easy to buy now.

I enclose my foot size and five dollars to pay for the moccasins. I would like to have quill work, porcupine quills, instead of beads.

My daughter Malory says to tell you that she is very happy about the moccasins you made for her. They made her heart glad. She is proud of them, and says to thank you very much.
