

Your letter came in answer to my wishing to find some one courageous enough to defend the great man, Sitting Bull. Recently his murderer, Red Tomahawk was heralded in large headlines, "The Man who killed Sitting Bull". The fact is Red Tomahawk was a "police" when he shot and killed Sitting Bull, unarmed and in no way resisting his unjustifiable arrest. I wrote at length about this glorification of an assassin to the new Commissioner of Indian Affairs, a copy of which I will send you.

It was my pleasure to meet Dr. E. E. Dale last December, attending a Conference of Friends of the Indian, held at Atlantic City. I count Dr. Dale as a real friend to our Indian people.
