

If you will read the text carefully I think you will conclude that Baldwin's <sup>consecutive</sup> two winter night marches was almost a record for a ship & exposure. I have campaigned in Montana in below zero weather & know that such an experience is no joke! After this brief Campaign of Baldwin's was over one of his officers (Lt Hinkle) resigned Jan 31/1877

For six or more months past I have by correspondence been trying to get the exact location of the fight of Dec 18, 1876 & now have it, and expect to have it in expensively marked in June next - the marker being similar to one I had put up on Big Cr Idaho to mark the site of an engagement & burial place of a man killed. <sup>These participants</sup> I wrote the history of this Campaign <sup>in 2 weeks</sup> <sup>was</sup> <sup>of</sup> the Idaho Historical Society & they published it in their report for 1925-26.

In your researches you doubtless have discovered a half breed Scout Joe Culbertson, who like Pomphrey was a very handsome fellow. His widow now living at Poplar Montana sent me two photos. Scott writes me that he knew him well. Mrs Culbertson has about 200 pages of MS written by Joe of his reminiscences but Mr Budd Pres C. H. Roby writes me that she wants about \$600.00 for them.
