The boys of the Sioux and these Indians played together a good deal. It seemed there was no line between the tribes. They mingle together and get along fine.

The Dakotas consider the Cheyennes just the same as if they were a band of the Sioux. The Arapahos are about the same but the Cheyenne are closer to the Sioux than the Arapahos. A great many Sioux and Cheyenne intermarry.

There is a year in the Sioux calendar where it mentions the Crows getting away with the Sioux horses. They didn't get all the horses but they stole quite a number of horses at one time. The most was about 30 head of Sioux horses.

During the time of SB Shave Head and several others, Lone Man, went up to visit the Crows after they settled down on the reservation. The Crows would get up and tell of some war deed generally against the Sioux. Every now and then before they give a present to a visiting Sioux they would get up and say I did this and that etc. The Sioux took it all in but Lone Man got tired of it because for about a week they did the same thing over and over again with different stories, rather exaggerated. Lone Man decided that being on their ground he would just take it all in but <sup>the</sup> ~~at~~ last day the Sioux decided to do something. So Lone Man studied around and said, "I have a lot to say but it is not going to be made up stories." So Lone Man got up and told a story of Crow and Sioux fight. He said, "Right in this spot we had a fight" and he mentioned certain men in it. "During the night after we conquered
