Ahern, then a young lieutenant fresh from West Point, came to join his regiment, the Twenty-Fifth Infantry. Colonel George Andrews, commanding, found that Ahern was something of a linguist, and asked him to take charge of Sitting Bull's fan mail, which was becoming abundant. Letters addressed to Sitting Bull were being received not only from people in the United States, but from many foreign lands. They were, for the most part, requests for his pipe, knife, tomahawk, and especially for his autograph!
