The Committee of Council have had under consideration the diparatch dispatch of the 14th Bebruary last from the Rt. Hon bee Sir Edward Thornton to your Excellency on the subject of an alleged concentration of Indians of various tribes in the Bear Paw Mountains, within United States territory.

They have also had before thema memorandum dated 28th February 1879 from the Nonorable the Minister of the Interior, to whom said despatch had been referred, and they answer in the views and recommendations and submit the dame for your excellencies approval, and recommend that a copy of this minute and of the memorandum be transmitted to Sir Edward Thornton for the information of the United States Government.

Memorandum

In the , matter of the Despatch of the 14th instant from the Right Hon: Sir EDward Thornton to his Excellency the Govenor General on the a subject of an alleged concentration pf Indians of var ous tribes from British Territory in the Bears Paw Mountains, within United States ter# ritory, the undersigned has the honor to report for the information of his excellency that he has caused inquiry to be made of the officer in command of the Northwest Mounted Police at Fort Walsh as to the facts. and in has further requested in the event of such gathering having occu rred, that all the information obtainable he furnished as to the subjec iof the movement.

In the meantime, pending the receipt of the information asked for the u ndersigned begs to express the conviction that the reason allegde in the communication of M- Seward to Sir Thornton, under date o of the 13th instant, for the General conveyances of all these Indians towards that section of canntry, will be found to be the true one, that isto say the pursuit of the buffalo, which they claim as nowhere akse to be found north of thr Missoura River.

The undersigned is of another opinion, should the alleged taken movement be shown to have taken place, that it will prove to have been the result of necessity on the part of the Indians tofollow the buffalo across the boundary line and into the United States territory in order to procure food for themselves and their fam lies, the herds having
