Tales of Glacier National Park."

Don't forget to send him a copy of
your book, perhaps with a short letter
of explanation & mentioning that G. P. &
the Blackfeet are mentioned in it.

He seems to like to come in touch with
authors & artists. He is something of an
artist (amateur painter) himself.

I just see in Schultz' book "Blackfoot Tales etc."
(p. 23) the story of Thunder Medicine as told
by a Blackfoot whom I know.

In this story the Thunder is represented
as a man. The Blackfeet were evidently
by entering upon the anthropomorphic
stage in their religion.

You make Thunder make paint to Thunder -
being as a bird on W. S. Shield. Have
you any authority for a Blackfoot
Thunder bird? If not this will probably
require a change though not a great one,
as he may represent the Thunder as a
winged man, though I have never seen
such a figure among the Blackfeet.

Perhaps this point will require a note.
