I have not kept in mind all that has been said in regard to the translation of HAPPY HUNTING GROUNDS. I remember that we said it was all right for Herr Hotz to make the translation into the German language. We have no business arrangement with him, as I recall, as to what further action is to be taken.

Personally I do not care to extend to this man the right to publish and handle this book on the basis proposed by him.

In other words \$50 isn't sufficient compensation to engage our attention and to be troubled with the correspondence. However, I want to please you in this matter.

We would not be troubled sending these illustrations to this man and carrying on correspondence for anything less than \$1000, or at least \$500, unless you want us to do so. You and the author of the book should make suggestions to us as to what you would like to have us do as publishers.

In the event we should give this man all he asks for in the way of rights to publish the book, use of illustrations, we would be compelled to require a royalty on all books sold and to pay something for the use of the pictures.
