

that right as soon as he has found a publisher who will publish the book in harmony with his wishes.

I am afraid that the demand of Carnahan for \$1000 or even for \$500 is by far too high for any German publisher to pay under the present very bad economic conditions in Central Europe. The people hardly have any money today to buy any books at all. And besides that there is the strong Nazi aversion towards all "non-Aryans" which includes, of course, also our Indians.

I naturally sympathize with a man who has learned English for the purpose of studying American ethnological literature and who goes to the trouble of translating an English book although he knows that it will probably not pay and saves enough from his meager salary to buy the best books on the subject (he seems to have all of yours) and even starts an Indian collection with the provision in his will that after his death it shall go to the University Museum of Zurich.

If Carnahan insists upon the high remuneration of \$1000 or even \$500 it will simply mean that there will not be any German publication of the book until full economic recovery has taken place in Central Europe, which may not happen within our lifetime.

Please let me know as soon as you have come to a decision in this matter.
