horses are supplied, the remaining available horses would be given to men or women desiring to ride in the parade, first come, first served. After the parade, all horses are to be delivered back to the horse checker. This system has been followed in previous years. (4) Complaint was made of the banner on Main Street, which was hung so low that it interfered with tipis on floats. The Secretary-Manager said that this would be corrected.

REGISTRATION. The importance of registration is emphasized. Every tribal leader should see to it that his tribe registers at the office at the entry to the camp. Names and addresses of visitors should be carefully noted on the register. The names of any dignitaries or historic members of tribes should be listed for the benefit of the Masters of Ceremony. Indians stopping at hotels or motels should register at the Indian Days Headquarters, Bank of Commerce Building basement, Sheridan, upon arrival.

It was pointed out that there would be no afternoon program on August 3.

It was moved and seconded that the Committee meet on the evening of August 2, to arrange parade details, and should again meet on August 3 at 5:00 in the afternoon on the stage of the grounds, to complete arrangements for the opening program, and to take care of other details. Motion carried.

There being no program on the afternoon of August 3, the consensus of opinion was that food distribution be made at that time. The Committee was unanimous in the opinion that the method of food distribution last year was about as good as any that could be devised.

At this time, Mr. Robert Yellowtail, a visitor, asked for the floor. He welcomed the Committee members to the Crow Country. He stated that he had proposed to the Crow Tribal Council that they donate two buffalo, which would be slaughtered and hung about ten days before the celebration, to be barbecued and served on the afternoon of August 3, following the parade. Mr. Tom Harwood then volunteered to ask the Blackfeet Tribal Council to also furnish a buffalo, or funds to pay for the men to do the barbecuing or other food to be served at that time. The Committee members thanked Mr. Yellowtail and Mr. Harwood for these very fine gestures.

A discussion was then had as to preparing the tribes to arrange their programs well in advance of their leaving for Sheridan. Mr. George Harris explained the system he used with the Cheyenne Tribe, and suggested that it be followed by the others. Cards and charts are prepared, showing the number of people signing up to attend the show, if they are bringing tipis, horses, arts and crafts, and what contribution they intend to make on the program. Tribal leaders were urged to notify All American Indian Days office as far in advance as possible, in order

•
