Committee members were told to urge Indian artists, both adult and school and college students, to enter paintings and other art work. Echohawk explained that all pictures should be "matted" for exhibit, so that they would not be damaged in handling.

GENERAL DISCUSSION. Each tribe should select informed individuals to act as judges in dancing ceremonies, etc. All of these judges' names would be placed in a hat, and a drawing made the night before the celebration, so that judges would be available instantly at the time needed.

Each tribe was urged to provide drummers and singers, and to see that they are on hand when wanted to avoid delay. It was pointed out by the Secretary-Manager that last year many Indians appeared in costume and there were some big dances held the night before the celebration, and that the gates were open. Many people came to watch this big dance, and then did not attend the programs the following days. In case the Indians decide to have a social dance of their own, the night previous to the show, all the gates but one would be locked, and there would be no white admittance except officials or individuals having business on the grounds.

Chairman Deernose announced that there would be no cars permitted in the arena at any time during performances. The arena would be cleared at least thirty minutes before performances began. The committeemen were urged to notify the Secretary-Manager of the number of tipis which their groups intended to bring, so that there would be poles available for them upon arrival. The Secretary-Manager urged each committeeman to see that no poles were cut up or broken. He pointed out that last year a number of new poles were cut up, and that these poles cost \$1.50 each.

It was decided to hold a meeting of the entire committee with the white committeemen at 5:00 the day previous to the show to make final arrangements for the parade. An Indian Committee meeting will be held on the afternoon of August 3 at 5:00 to arrange for the grand opening and entry, and program the night of Aug. 3.

Chairman Deernose urged all Committee members to see to it that their tribes be on time, pointing out that a delay of any one event delays the entire program.

Chairman Deernose suggested that each tribe bring their own law enforcement officers, if possible. These officers could be deputized while in Sheridan.

Committeeman Motanic expressed the view that the sale of beer on the grounds should be eliminated, particularly on Sunday. Some discussion followed, and the consensus of opinion expressed it would be best if the sale of beer would be prohibited. The Secretary-Manager agreed to take the matter up with the trustees and the concessionaires.
