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Pawnee Maiden From Utah Chosen 'Miss Indian America' At Sheridan

SHERIDAN, Wyo. (AP) — Five thousand Indians from 47 tribes in the United States and Canada scattered toward their homes Monday after picking Sandra May Grover, 20, Brigham City, Utah, as Miss Indian America IV.

The Pawnee maiden was chosen from among 91 contestants to represent all American Indians as a typical Indian girl.

She will be a guest at the Miss America pageant at Atlantic City, N. J., next month. She was chosen on the basis of poise, personality and knowledge of tribal customs and legends. Her Indian name is Yellow Star.

Miss Gover's selection closed the All American Indian Days which brought the Indians to Sheridan for three days of pageantry, con-

tests, games and exhibits of handicraft.

Honorable mention was voted to Marie Ann Moss, an Arapahoe, of St. Stephens Mission, Wyo.; Annie Grace Strange Owl, a Cheyenne, of Birney, Mont.; Ruth Dee Larsen, a Gros Ventre, of Butte, Mont.; Mary Geneva Whiteman, a Crow, of Edgar, Mont., Dolores Marie Racine, a Blackfeet, of Browning, Mont.

Among gifts presented to Miss Grover was a turquoise necklace valued at \$1,500 from the Inter-Tribal Indian Ceremonial Assn. of Gallup, N. M. The presentation was by Gov. Milward Simpson of Wyoming.
