BLACK EYE. At Fort Rice the Government advised to be at peace, and make a treaty of friendship, and if we did so we should have a span of horses, a cow, and a bull, Chickens, and sheep, and three different kinds of wagons.

By Mr. CAMERON:

Q. Were all these things put into the treaty? - A. They told us they were: and that is the way we understood it, and we have been waiting for these things, but have never received anything yet.

Q. Were these things put into the paper you signed at that time? - A. Yes; we are positive it was all written in that paper. They also promised to build houses for us, but they are built of pine, and are not good. I remember all this distinctly, because I was a chief at the time. They also said they would give us a steamboat. *who?* Some one told us that one of you men will be our Great Father in the future, and I want to speak to him now about these things. The Government asked us for a right of way at Bismarck, and promised to pay us for it, but we have never received any pay yet for it; and they told us that our reservation would run from Fort Rice to the Yellowstone River.

John Glass recalled.

By the CHAIRMAN:

Q. Do the Indians expect to keep all their land and not do anything toward taking care -- of themselves? - A. We have been arguing about the boundary lines of our reservation, and we have come here to ask you to make them plain for us.

Q. Would you and your people like to live as white men live? - A. Do you mean that for me personally?

Q. Do you think these Indians - your friends at this agency here - want to learn how to live as white men live? - A. Yes, sir; they do.

Q. Does each one of them want to have a farm that he can keep everybody else off of if he wants to? - A. Of course; that is the way we want to live, but we are not
