Capt. Henry Harrison Tucker was at Arickaree and wounded 3 times. His wife was Charlotte Ingersoll who taught the first school in Concord twp. (Minneapolis) They had 4 boys and 2 girls who also went to school in Minneapolis. They came here in '89 and he died at Roosevelt in 1908 age 67. The boys used to print the Daily Pointer a free paper that appeared on the streets here for many years. Their parents had owned and printed the Minneapolis Independent and also The Review. He knew them well. Mrs Tucker was a smart woman but red headed and radical. Repub. papers gave her the d - l, when the Pops were raising H - in Kansas.

I also have the story of Capt. Howard Norton, afterward probate judge and it is a thrilling story of how he had circumnavigated the globe and served as a mariner on his fathers ships and how
