About the Exposition

The American Indian Exposition is the only Exposition in the United States managed exclusively by Indians.



In the Arts and Crafts exhibit halls are booths where visitors may purchase genuine Indian hand-made souvenirs. There are numerous articles from which selection may be made.



There are several demonstration booths in the Arts and Crafts building where one may see Indian artisans engaged in handcrafts such as silversmithing, woodcarving, basket weaving, etc. These demonstrations are interesting and educational.



For contrast and variety the exhibits in the Arts and Crafts buildings are the largest and finest ever shown by Indians in Oklahoma.



Exposition visitors may see intimate views of Indian life by visiting the Indian village adjacent to the Exposition grounds. No admission is charged and cameras are permitted.



Exposition visitors who are interested in art are invited to visit the postoffice building in Anadarko while attending the Exposition. Here Indian painters have decorated the walls of the lobby with massive murals depicting scenes from Indian life.



Headquarters of the American Indian Exposition are located in a unique Teepee office building at 120 East Broadway. Visitors are invited to visit this office at their pleasure.



Many historical sites of Indian interest are located adjacent to Anadarko. For information and directions call the Anadarko Chamber of Commerce.
