issuance of subpenas to summon witnesses and compel the 1 production of documents at trial; the summoning of jurors 2 3 and the waiver of jury trial; the form and manner of entry of judgments; the manner of executing judgments; the con-4 duct of supplementary proceedings; the survival of actions 5 and the substitution of parties; the amounts and manner 6 7 of payment of fees to the clerk or the marshal of the court; 8 the practice of attorneys; and such other matters as may 9 require regulation in order to provide a complete system 10 of procedure for the conduct of the court. In general the rules of court shall conform as nearly as possible to the 11 statutes regulating the procedure in the district courts of 12 13 the United States, the rules of the Supreme Court governing 14 causes in said district courts, and the practice in the courts of the State in which the controversy arises, save that the 15 rules shall, so far as possible, be nontechnical in character 16 and fitted to the needs of prospective litigants. 17 18 SEC. 8. The court may provide, by rules to be pro-19 mulgated by it, for appeals to the full court from judgments 20 rendered on circuit by less than a majority of the full court. 21 Sec. 9. All substantial rights accorded to the accused 22in criminal prosecutions in the district courts of the United 23States shall be accorded in prosecutions in the Court of 24Indian Affairs. The trial of offenses punishable by death 25 or by imprisonment for a period exceeding five years shall
