lbs flour, one bush onions, $\frac{1}{2}$ bush potatoes, one (1) Spencer carbine, and one (1) double Blankets. All this on the 13th of Sept., 1878. On the 15th of Sept, Mr. J. L. Driskill lost on the Cimarron river, near mouth of Bear Creek, fifty (55) horses, valued at \$75.00 each. Mr Driskill was unable to state what number of cattle he lost, until he had them rounded up; his cattle are scattered over some 300 Square miles of country. On the 16th of Sept. at Spencer Bros. Camp on Bear Creek ($1\frac{1}{2}$) miles north of Soldiers graves, was lost, two horses belonging to Spencer Bros. One (1) horse belonging to G. W. Shoemaker, a herder, 100 lbs. flour, 1 bushel beans, 1 bushel onions, $\frac{1}{2}$ doz knives and forks, $\frac{1}{2}$ doz tin cups, 1 camp kettle, 20 lbs coffee, 10 lbs. dried apples, 1 gal vinegar, 1 gal. molasses, 1 set harness (2 horse), six (6) blankets, 200 feet $\frac{1}{2}$ inch rope, three (3) pr. trousers, seven (7) suits of underclothes,. On the 18th of Sept 1878, five (5) miles east of Fort Dodge, on the Arkansas River, Mr. John Fraser lost of five (5) horses and on the same date, Mr. S.B. Williams, lost on Sand Creek, four hundred (400) sheep, improved stock, one (1) horse, one 1 sett harness, bedding and camp outfit and provisions, all valued at two thousand (2000) dollars, also on the same date viz. Sept. 18, 1878 at Chapman and Tuttle's Camp on Crooked Creek about 30 miles south of Dodge City, George Simmonds, (col^d) cook for Chapman and Tuttle, was killed, Chapman and Tuttle lost twenty four (24) horses, 1 Sett Harness (2 horse), one wagon broken up, one (1) field glass, and Camp outfit. In all two thousand (2000) dollars worth. On the 16th of Sept, three miles from Cimarron river on the Camp Supply road Milton Burr lost one (1) horse and one (1) mule and camp outfit, at same time, an emigrant to Texas, whose property Burr was hauling, lost all his effects. I have been unable to ascertain his name or present whereabouts,. On the 19th Sept. Con-Red a swede, herder for W.C. Quinlan, was killed on Sand Creek near mouth of Spring Creek; two (2) horses taken from Con-Red. On the 21st of Sept. 1878. Thomas Murray and Samuel Leforce were missing from Quillans Camp. The body of Thomas Murray was found on 2nd of Oct, four miles up Spring Creek,
