The gallantry, skill and perseverance of 1st Lieutenant H. B. Cushing, 3d U. S. Cavalry, (commanding,) 2d Lieutenant F. Yeaton, 3d Cavalry, and the non-commissioned officers and soldiers (thirty-one in number,) of Troop "F" of the same Regiment, during a recent pursuit of and engagement with a band of hostile Indians who had stolen a large herd of cattle on the "Rio Hondo," New Mexico, deserve especial mention and commendation from the Major General Commanding.

Lieutenant Cushing's command started from Fort Stanton, N. M., in pursuit of the robbers at 5 p.m. on the 14th ult., marching that night and the following morning to Casey's Ranche on the Rio Hondo, (where the cattle had been stolen,) and taking the trail of the Indians near that point, followed it hotly over an exceedingly broken and difficult country—the march impeded by storms of rain and snow—
