Thousands Are Named in Indian Land Cases

MUSKOGEE, Ok., April 13. (AP)—
Fifty more suits involving Indian
oil and potential oil lands in Semi-
nole, Creek and Hughes county have
been filed in federal court here in
the last two days by attorneys rep-
resenting Indians of half Creek and
half Seminole blood.

The last 50 suits bring the total
number based on the same question
and filed within the past two weeks
to more than 80. All are brought to
remove clouds from titles to land
and the last 50 name a total of more
than 2,000 defendants, and involve
lands valued by a rough estimate at
more than \$25,000,000. Practically
every oil company in the state, is
named in some petition and many
of them are named in ten or more.
The suits are all based on the con-
tention that the plaintiffs, or plain-
tiffs' ancestors, were full blood In-
dians, half Seminole and half Creek,
and as such were owners of allotted
lands which fell under the govern-
ment regulations and restrictions on
full blood's land.
