Must Be Sentenced Before Pardoned

OKLAHOMA CITY, Nov. 9.—The state criminal court of appeals Saturday held that a man cannot be pardoned before he is sentenced. The decision was issued in the case of Sam White, convicted of manslaughter by a district court in Okfuskee county and sentenced to seven years in the state penitentiary. White applied for a writ of habeas corpus on the authority of the pardon issued by former Governor J. C. Walton. The pardon was issued after the jury found him guilty but before he had been sentenced. The court held that White was not convicted until after the judge had passed sentence.

PRINCESS 'SISTER' OF EXPO BEAUTY

Mother of Margaret
Trainer Foster Parent of
'Sunshine Rider'

Those who met and admired the Princess West Virginia, Miss Margaret Isabelle Trainer, during the International Petroleum Exposition here were surprised to learn that she is the "twin sister" of "Sunshine Rider," who was acquitted Friday in the New York courts on a grand larceny charge preferred by George Ainslie, wealthy New York art dealer.

According to New York dispatches there had been much speculation as to the source of income of "Sunshine Rider," Miss Ainslie Unkalunt, known also as a princess of the Cherokee nation. The mystery was cleared up when Mrs. J. E. Trainer of Salem, W. Va., mother of the state's princess at the Petroleum Exposition, testified that she had furnished "Sunshine Rider" with spending money.

Mrs. Trainer testified in New York that she was proud to be known as the "twin mother" of Sunshine

Rider and that she had furnished an apartment in New York for the Cherokee princess and Miss Trainer, the Princess West Virginia. She also testified that she had given "Sunshine Rider" between \$4,000 and \$5,000 for spending money. Mrs. Trainer testified that she first met the accused woman when she and Miss Trainer were studying music together at a conservatory. That was in 1915. "I love her and was interested in her career," Mrs. Trainer testified in the New York trial of her foster daughter, in explaining why she had given the girl so much spending money.

When the time came at the exposition to choose Queen Petrolia the contest narrowed down to Miss Trainer, Princess West Virginia and Miss Marcella Romania Trean, Princess Kansas, the latter finally winning after an extra judge had been secured. Miss Trainer made a host of friends here by her charm and graciousness of manner.

NEW YORK, Nov. 11.—Princess Nannie Unkalunt of Muskogee, victorious in a vivid four-day court battle which ended in her acquittal on a charge of grand larceny brought by Mrs. Lucia Benedict appeared Saturday to harbor no ill feeling against those who had accused her.

She only said she pitied "poor Mr. Ainslie"—George H. Ainslie, Fifth avenue art dealer, father of

Mrs. Benedict, and reputed suitor for the princess' affections.

Ainslie and his daughter were not as willing to let the court decision end the case. They announced their intention of asking District Attorney Banton to proceed against the princess before the grand jury asking an indictment for theft.

JAY, Okla., Dec. 1.—Moses Ridge Indian Baptist minister, said to be past the century mark and the oldest Cherokee in his tribe, was injured Thursday when a mule team he was driving ran away with him. His arm was severely bruised. Ridge has been removed to the Vinita hospital where he is recovering. Ridge holds the record of uniting more Cherokees in the bonds of matrimony than any other minister in Oklahoma.

Although he is around the century mark, he is Hale and hearty and is frequently seen driving a span of mules through the country. He lives about 10 miles west of here on Moss Ridge prairie, which was named for him in an early day.
