Among her numerous awards, Gray lists the Gallup Ceremonials; Best in Graphics Category-Tulsa Indian Arts Festival; Southwest American Indian Art, Santa Fe Indian Market, Fellowship Award winner; Eight Northern Pueblos Annual Show; National American Cultural Arts Festival, first place, textiles; and Red Earth Fine Arts Competition, first place.

1992 awards include Tulsa Indian Art Festival; Smithsonian Museum of American Indian (Clan Seeker); 71st Inter-tribal Indian Ceremonials, 71st Annual S.W.A.I.A. Santa Fe Indian Market; and Indian Summer.

Gray's selection as featured artist follows a prestigious tradition of honoring outstanding Oklahoma Indian artist during the Tulsa Indian Arts Festival. "The finest Indian artists are found here in Oklahoma," states Julia Galvin, Juried Art Show Chairperson and Delaware tribal member. "Other featured artists have included Austin Realrider, Pawnee sculptor, in 1992; Clancy Gray, Osage jeweler, in 1991; Charles Chapman, Pawnee painter, in 1990; Dana Tiger, Creek/Seminole/Cherokee artist, in 1989; Skip Rowell, Cherokee artist, in 1988; and Ben Shoemake, Cherokee artist, in 1987." "These artists are among the world's finest," Galvin states.
