This letter is in response to your comments on T.V.(C-Span) concerning prisoners taking jobs away from Native Americans.

Enclosed is a copy of the article where Diane King's husband was recently falsely convicted of the murder of Diane King. Diane King was investigating the Prison Labor in Michigan which is the 3rd largest Industry in the State. Diane was a Native American. Evidence of what Diane was investigating was withheld from Diane's Mother and Sisters and was not allowed, by the Judge, to be presented to the Jury in the court trial. Consequently, the family was pleased with the verdict. However, we believe that a great injustice has been done to her husband and his family and that Diane's Children are being denied the rights and privilege of being raised by their natural Father and both sides of their families.

We are asking you as Chief and a woman to insist on an investigation of the injustice to Diane King and Bradford King---for the good of all Americans.

We are enclosing the 12-31-92 letter of complaint we sent to our newly elected U.S. Representative from Michigan for the 7th District. We are enclosing the concept of <u>ReInventing Government</u> proposed by the Kellogg Foundation---which caused the murder of other persons who buck the Kellogg Corporate Power.
