Dear Friend of Justice:

You're known as a loyal friend of unjustly treated people.

That's why I'm sending this letter to the list your name is on...and why I hope you'll accept and use the special stamps I've enclosed.

The American Indian Relief Council is making these stamps the centerpiece of our campaign to remind our fellow Americans about "America's Forgotten Minority."

The 24 stamps are yours to keep and use without any obligation on your part.

I hope the original art work on the stamps, created exclusively for this project, will remind you of the Native American people when you use the stamps — not for postage, of course, but to seal letters and packages to your family, friends or business associates.

These stamps will carry the personal message of <u>your</u> support for fairness towards America's Forgotten Minority.

I'm hoping you will also consider sending a contribution to help the American Indian Relief Council's program of self-help and emergency assistance to Native Americans.

But whether you send a contribution or not, please use the stamps to show that discrimination against Native Americans is not "OK" with you.
