governmental system, whatever changes your Honorable Body may deem prudent to inaugurate, I would respectfully suggest that there be no violent reforms—our people are just entering the threshold of Constitutional Government and need very little legislation, and that little of a character the nearest adopted to their present views of their necessities—as the people advance in governmental science, they will discover such additional legislation as their advancing Condition requires, and avail themselves of it—thus the onward advancement of our government towards a more perfect system will be the legitimate out growth of experience, and not the fitful dreams of theorists who experiment upon the passions and feelings and imaginary wants of a simple people.

And now gentlemen of the council In conclusion I have to ask your indulgence for this long tresspass upon your time and patience. I have been called out by the strength of my feelings to introduce some matters which may not be considered as appropriate in an executive message, but the love and interest I feel for my people in all that concerns us as individuals and as a Nation have compelled me to go beyond the usual limits of an annual message and I have suggested counsel that my long experience as your executive seemed to me as proper and conducive to the good government for the Muskokee Nation.
