Be it resolved by the General Council of the Choctaw Nation.

That we have heard with profound sorrow of the death at the hands of an assassin of our beloved President William McKinley. He was a man whose life was gentle and kind. His sympathies were always with the masses of his countrymen and their interests and welfare were his constant study. His public life was above reproach and his private life typified all that was best and purest in the American Home. He was born in obscurity yet called by the American people to the highest position in their confidence and love, and under his wise and patriotic administration of public affairs, new prestige was added to our country and new lustre to our flag.

That the Choctaw people recall with gratitude the many evidences of his friendship for and interest in them and his efforts to protect them in the enjoyment of all their rights.

That we deplore the fact that he was stricken down by the bloody hand of anarchy while extending friendly greeting to his fellow countryman.

That we condemn anarchy and all the agencies that foster and encourage it

We believe the United States Government should speedily enact laws that will stamp out anarchy and make its existence forever impossible hereafter in this country.

That we unite with all good citizens in extending our deep sympathy to the bereaved family of our late President.

That these resolutions be entered upon the Journal of both Houses of the General Council and that the National Secretary be and he is hereby required to furnish a copy of these resolutions to the family of the deceased.

Bill No 20.

The Committee on Chief Message to whom was referred the matter of selling Tuskalooa academy property and paying Henry Willis custodian of said property, have carefully examined the same and respectfully ask the adoption of the following act:

Be it enacted by the General Council of the Choctaw Nation assembled:

Sec 1st That the Superintendent of Public Instruction be and is hereby authorized and directed to sell after giving thirty (30) days notice in some news paper published in the Choctaw Nation at public auction the Tuskalooa Academy property including building, beds furniture, and other chattels belonging thereto for cash in full and said property shall not bring less than Eight (\$800.00) Hundred dollars.

Sec 2 That six hundred (\$600.00) dollars of the proceeds of said sale shall be applied to the settlement of Henry Willis custodian of said property and the said superintendent of Public Instruction is hereby required to demand and accept a receipt of all accounts that the said Henry Willis
