STATE CLUB LEADER DIES

Illness Fatal for Mrs. C. Guy Cutlip; Services Set for Tuesday

World's Own Service

WEWOKA, Jan. 14.—Mrs. C. Guy Cutlip, pioneer Oklahoman, former president of the Oklahoma Federation of Women's clubs and nationally-known club worker, died at a hospital here this afternoon. Death followed a critical illness.

Funeral services are to be held in the Christian church here at 2 p. m. Tuesday with Rev. Harold Stine of Wewoka officiating. Burial will be made in Wewoka cemetery. Born in Clarksville, Ark., the daughter of A. W. and Mary Catherine Butts, the future Mrs. Cutlip came to Oklahoma by covered wagon in 1889 and had been a resident of Wewoka since 1900.

She married C. Guy Cutlip in Wewoka in 1902. The husband, widely-known state attorney and jurist, died in 1937.

Mrs. Cutlip was a member of Wewoka's first women's club, the Bayview Study club. She also held membership and was active in Athenaeum, Garden club, Order of Eastern Star and P. E. O.

She served as president of the State Federation of Women's clubs from 1937 to 1940 and as state director to the general federation of women's clubs from 1940 to 1943. She also has served as president of the state's fifth district of the federated women's clubs, as well as chairman of the "Juniors" division of the state federation.

At the time of her death she was historian of the state federation, and until her recent illness had devoted most of her time to the subject in which she held deep interest—the compilation of the history of the State Federation of Women's clubs in Oklahoma.

She is survived by a daughter, Miss Maxine Cutlip, of the home.
