from 1937 to 1940 and as state director to the general federation of women's clubs from 1940 to 1943. She also has served as president of the state's fifth district of the federated women's clubs, as well as chairman of the "Juniors" division of the state federation.

At the time of her death she was historian of the state federation, and until her recent illness had de-voted most of her time to the sub-ject in which she held deep interest; —the compilation of the history of the State Federation of Women's clubs in Oklahoma.
