Most of 'em did.

(They sure did.)

That's what I believe in is work.

Mrs. Beck: That building of his father's was never used, though, except just the bottom floor.

(Well that would be a relic itself, too, wouldn't it?)

(If a feller could get it out.)

It'd be in pieces.

(Probably so. And this lumber has been here all this time in this floor?)
That's right.

(That's a long time ago.)

This is a lighter's screw here. You can raise or lower it or when you can put up the shade. It'll run in the thousands of an inch. Raise this up 8 times and let it down slowly about four and then sit down there feel that meal come out there. Getting it plenty down through here and in some cups. Pour it out over there. And this here is what would control the feed, right here. Run it down and put it down there like that. There's the old crane, what lifted it up and sharpened it.

(What do those ourrs weigh there?)

They weigh about a ton, I guess.
