Yeah, it was the first cancellation of three months it's \$3.29.

(You get rich fast that way, don't you?)

Yeah, and it was carried horseback, three times a week--the mail was.

(Where did the mail come from?)

Come from Moody.

(Where was the original stores at Terecita?)

The original one was right where that one is.

(Where it is now.)

But it was facing north. It've got a picture here, Mama has, of Papa standing in there with their youngest boy. Standing in front of the store, an old store building, built when I was 12 years old and it was facing north, but it was just right in the vicinity. Just right there.

(About when did the actual community or the settlement start there at that little place?)

At Terecita? Well, when we moved down there, there was two white people. Two families, white people and, let's see, we moved there in 1910 and then by--well I can't remember exact; but I know it wasn't long till they was more whites moving in, you know, the Indians moved out.
