That's right. We don't want to be reminded and we would rather that this theater will never be opened.

(Well, I know they're going to have some, the people that are in the play, they're trying to recruit Indian people to play these parts, are they successful?)

Well, they may be successful, but they are forced by need of welfare. They have to work at any price and do anything for their support of their family. I understand that there will be some would even have to crawl on their bellies to reach the goals to support their families, for their needs.

(Un-huh. And a lot of the full-blood Cherokees feel this way about it, Huh?)

Yes, there are numbers of Cherokee's that are feeling very badly about this Amphi-theater. Faye, I might ask you this question, if the White people were defeated, as the Cherokees were defeated when they were driven to the Cherokee Nation, if this was vice-versa, the Whites were defeated and the Whites had to furnish their people to show the way they were brought and treated, how would the White people react from this amphi-theater, that will be put on by the Whites?

(Humnn--gee, I don't know, Mr. Groundhog, that throws it into a different light, doesn't it?)
