(I was thinking there was another family of Fields. Now they lived around that part of the country, on Peters Prairie.)

Well, yes they did. Uncle Bud, Wesley and Zeke and Dick and Richard. That was Uncle Bud's boys. They were my first cousins. The younger Zeke now the old Zeke was a different one, he was Uncle Bud's brother, I believe. And so they just kind of mixed up out there. It's been so long and haven't seen anybody to talk about it.

(Of course they had farms all around that country?)

Oh yeah. Old Uncle Bud had lots of land back on the prairie. He just had lots of it. Stockmen, family stock, raised cattle and hogs.

(There was some of the folks by the name of England, too, up in there at one time. I noticed that (not clear)--)

Yes. Joe England. Old Joe England, that was his son, was Bill England. He married Velma Peters, married Uncle Bud's brother, Wesley girl. That Wesley girl. Bill's dead--Bill England's dead. I don't remember what he died of. Anyhow he died and his wife died. I remember she was Wes Fields daughter. She was a Fields. She married England. I think a lot of them was buried in that Field cemetery.

(There must have been a lot of people in that country at one time. Course there's nobody there now to speak of.)
