But he was here for several days, in and out. And he was over at Peoria Town and, and all over, all over the country here and he was down, down in the, in the Seneca Nation and Senecas, Cahokia and all down through there. I don't know what all he wanted, but he was very nice and I appreciated his way of treatment of everything. But, and on the other hand, I've had another fellow or two here. I can't recall their names right at the present time, but they all figured that, ah, we were still in the blanket stage. But I told them we were far from that status, anyway. And oh, we've had, we've had quite--at one time here, this fellow Carter come down here and he wanted to put us back on reservations, you know, in tents, tipis, and so on and so forth, and that didn't work out either.
