There's about eight Poolaw's in service somewhere in the camp. Some of them--about four of them are at Vietnam at this hour. So I'm going to sing a song to, a religious hymn.

(Sings hymn.)

Keep on praying, pray. It makes you feel happy. It makes you feel good. Keep on praying. That's what I been doing everyday. Keep on praying. It's all things are possible with God. How true it is. I'm not a preacher, but I'm a lay preacher. I can go out any churches anywhere. And I'm happy that I'm born again Kiowa Indian, Mose Poolaw. The close of it, recorded here at my niece's home, Leila Paddlety, very happy to kill a few moments of my time here to give appraisement of our beloved son, Jesus Christ. Nothing is impossible with him, folks. Join, join his organization. When you in trouble you can turn to him for help. He'll help you. And the close of it, a hymn. I want to sing a Comanche hymn.

(Sings Comanche hymn.)

A-ho. I'm glad to have this few minutes. Praise God. Remember when you pray, pray for all of our Indian people to this area.
