INDIAN-NEGRO STUDENT KNIFE FIGHTS LEADS TO DROPOUTS:

After my father had took me to this Mekuskey Mission, the colored people were already there. But we tried to get along with them as good as we know how to get along, but it seems like there was something there that it never could be solved, which the Indians and the colored people there could never get along. And there was always a fight and it come to where they got to stabbing each other with knives and so on. And as small as I was, I didn't want to be there in time of trouble or anything like that, so I spent approximately three months at that school and I finally ran off from the school and I had never been taken back to that school. I left there for good.

RIDING THE RANGE ON SEMINOLE NATIONS RANCHES:

After I left school, I stayed home for a little while and, finally, I got a job with Mr. Ott Quiley as a ranch hand. And that's where I first started really riding the range; round up the cattle; help brand; help butcher the cattle. And after I left Mr. Quiley's ranch, then I was employed by Mr. Pete Roger's ranch. And I worked with him in the same capacity there for a few years, and then from there I went to Mr. Lee Suit, which his ranch was located at Bearden. And of course, the distance wasn't too far apart, because there two groups that I work for was known then as Sylvan, Oklahoma, which is north-
