And then from there I went to Mr. Harry Browns. After I left Claude Littrell's ranch, I was hired by Mr. Harry Brown, which he was half Indian and half white. And my job was exclusively breaking broncs. And then after all the horses were brought in that was my job. So there was one particular horse that I would like to bring in
