Yes, from the light from the dead wood that he gathered and built a fire that night. That's what he used for a lamp.

Butler: My father said after he had quit here and beginning year when..on his off at the farm..he had time, he'd go out in the timber and get this rich resin pine and things in the fire and roots and after his mother and father would go to bed, he'd pitch that resin and roots and things in the fire so that would make a big blaze. Then he'd propla kitchen chair with a pillow on it....He was highly educated man.

(What kind of lights did he have at the school? At the Seminary?)

They had electric lights.

(Kind of heat did they have?)

They had fireplaces and wood stove too.

(Did they have inside plumbing?)

No.

(Outside toilet facilities?)

Yes.

ROLLO SCHOOL MINES:

(We're covered quite a bit here. You haven't told me--we hope tomorrow we can get about the football team that they had at the Male Seminary and this is about Rollo School of Mines?)

Rollo School Mines, in those days was considered a very good football team.

Talequah Seminary team used to go to Austin, Texas. Play Texas University and that one in Missouri too, but this particular time they were playing in Rollo, Miss-
