We came on to the just relating what happened to us at this day, this afternoon this morning and this afternoon. We came upon this home in the Indian camp and we approached we seen a great many cars. So we got out and we're greeted by Mr. Otto Hamilton, the present husband of Mrs. Lorena Hamilton and he greeted us and told us to sit down and I was standing on the porch while he was sitting, I was, Mr. Sylvester Tinker was sitting there and he had told, I shook hands with him and greeted Mr. Virgil Malone. He is the grandpa of the baby that was, that the board was made for and so is Mr. Gus Petsemoie and Mr. James Waters, a Ponca and there was Mr. Sylvester as I had said. And so, I went to Mr. Tinker struck up a conversation to--you know how it is when crowds gather, well they talk and this and that as the affair is being prepared, the dinner. And so Mr. Tinker was remarking that he had Oklahoma City and that he had went on tribal business and the tribal--it was the Public Health Service had more or less a conference down there and that there were really fairly successful in what they were trying to achieve and that he had also received an invitation or rather it wasn't an invitation, he is the a member of the Oklahoma Indian Affairs commission from the northern district and that he was going to be at Anadarko. So I also had told him I had been to Anadarko yesterday on the American Indian Exposition
