Yeah. I don't know what his--whether it's the Redbird families, I guess. I don't know about that. And there was Feared Looking Glass from--he was the outstanding Indian. He lived right south of town when we moved (not clear). Feared Looking Glass. Some of the Looking Glass got some stuff out here in the museum. I don't believe Feared out there. Maybe--I mean out at the souvenir shop, not at the museum.

(I know a Henry Looking Glass. Works in Oklahoma City.)

He's probably from the same family. What's his name?

(Henry Looking Glass.)

Henry, yeah. He was one of the younger ones. Henry is--he should be about 60. Is that about right?

(Yeah.)

I believe that's right. I guess that's his dad. I'm almost sure, his dad was Feared

(Feared was the old gentleman then. How old do you figure he was about that time?)

He wasn't an old Indian. In 1908 he was probably over 35 or 40 at that time. Be my guess. Kinda of a little country sight here--housing project.

(I certainly enjoyed going to the cemetery with you Mr. Cribbs.)

Well I'm glad to go down there. I'm sorry I got you messed up on the road.

(Well, that--we do that all the time.)
