EARLY LIFE IN OKLAHOMA AND ARIZONA

(You were born in?)

Lawton.

(Lawton.)

Yeah. I was born in Lawton and lived at my grandmother's place at Mountain View for a year and then my parents started working with the Indians service in 1935. And they moved out to Arizona. So I went--I grew up on a Navaho reservation. We lived for a time at Tuba City at Chinle and at Shiprock. And I lived for a time on the San Carlos reservation which is way down in southern Arizona.

(I bet there was lots Indians there?)

Yeah. Have you ever been on a Navaho reservation?

(Yeah.)

It's interesting country.

(I never been down to the San Carlos area. Our superintendent at the Osage agency, he was at San Carlos.)
