(That's one, you know, they don't allow any visitors, tapes or phonographs or nothing like that you know.)

Yeah.

(That's the only ceremonial they tried to retain, you know, among the tribe of Indians, you know. I was talking to this Comanche, Rhode Karrare, he said he had went up there last year, and that was really something to see. I'd like to go up there for a couple of days, see what they have to offer.)

I think so, I heard a little about the (conversation not clear) Blue Lake?

Yeah, I'd like to go to that sometime. Another thing I've always wanted to see was the Chalacoos (?) at Zuni. They have -- I've forgotten when it is might be November sometime, that's the all night thing with those Indians those real tall people come out and dance. Everybody I've talked to that has been to that says it is really something to see.

(What do they call that?)

Chalaco(?)

(I've been down on the Zuni reservation but it has been many years ago and I didn't stay very long.)

Woman's voice: (Our people always tell us not to go to this tribe, you know, don't go to that one. Do you have that among your tribe?)
