seen them pass, you know, with the kids. And her sister died, you know and they had a little girl, they never did go to school, I seen them pass.

(Hum. Well, times was hard wasn't it, Mom? How did they make a living; her Mom and Daddy?)

(Sakey: Speaks in Cherokee.) (Irrelevant conversation to child.)

Maggie: (words in Cherokee.) Wild onions, they live on wild onions,

Faye. And, Kanatachi, crawfish, and squirrel, rabbit. Anything they can get.

(Anything off the land?)

Maggie: Yeah, something like that. They never did anywhere grow something they could grow anywheres in a field. (Words to child not relevant)

And then I know, ---

(Like they hunt and fished a lot, didn't they?)

FATHER WAS CHIMNEY MAKER

Maggie: Yeah, and his Daddy, though he used to make chimney. He's the one that taught every one of them, you know. Hooley and Robert and he used to be good—there's some yet. See corner Huckleberry Corner, (Yeah, that chimney?)

Maggie: He built that.

(Now what was his name?)

Maggie: Speaks in Cherokee to Sakey. Wilson Bread.

(Wilson Bread. In other words he was a real good chimney maker and taught all those other men how to do that?)

Maggie: He used to make them log chimneys, too. Isn't that funny one burn the house, that time. We've had chimneys like that, like he built for us. Just a log, now. We' had a log house and a chimney log up there.
