Maggie: (Speaking to Sakey in Cherokee.) She can doctor head and her could doctor blackouts, you know, you get dizzy sometime and, she say, the bowels, when the bowels wouldn't move, you know that. I don't know nothing about that--(Laughter) That's good, that's the way for a couple of weeks.

(Now is that some kind of herb?)

Maggie: Uh-huh.

(Give for that?)

Maggie: (speaking to Sakey in Cherokee.)

(In Cherokee, what would that be, Mama?)

Maggie: Let's see I don't know the names. (Conversation in Cherokee between Maggie and Sakey)

INDIAN REMEDIES

(And you take the roots of this plant and you boil it, drink the tea and that's good for constipation. But you don't know the name of the plant, do you? I don't either. Do you know in Cherokee what it is?)

(Sakey and Maggie converse in Cherokee.) (Laughter) O-o-o-wee, I know I had it one time, you know I was (Cherokee) that's when--she said another thing
