(Oh, if you drink. If you drink that tea. From that broom.)

Sakey: (words in Cherokee.)

She said when your bleeding nose; she says she's pointin' to it--

(Bleeding nose?)

(Maggie and Sakey conversing. Maggie translating.) That's for your bleedin' nose. I don't know what she means. She said you just rub that on your bleedin' nose, like that, when your bleedin' nose.

(It will stop it? I wonder what it is?)

(Something in Cherokee.)

(Too bad we don't know the name of it.)

I know it.
